Before joining the Commission, Inge was a member of the Brussels bar where she practiced European competition law with two leading international law firms.

Nicholas Costello is the Deputy Head of Unit D1 at the European Commission's Department for Employment and Social Affairs (DG EMPL).

Valerio de Stefano is a BOFZAP Professor of Labour Law at KU Leuven, in Belgium. From 2014 to July 2017, Valerio worked at the International Labour Office (ILO) in Geneva, where he authored and edited several publications in the area of his main research interests: non-standard employment, work in the "platform" (gig) economy, fundamental labour rights, labour dispute resolutions and labour and human rights in global supply chains.

Dr Jan Drahokoupil is a Senior Researcher at the European Trade Union Institute (ETUI) where he coordinates research on digitalisation and the future of work.
