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

Allocation of work time (hours per week)








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


## Unpaid care, domestic work, and paid work




#### The Irish welfare state in comparative perspective

# Paid versus unpaid work incentives





## Early years work

- 98% female
- Average wage €12.55 per hour
- Only half have permanent jobs
- ~Fifth are unionised





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## Adult care workers

- 92% female
- Mostly nursing home and home care
- ~€12.79 per hour
- High levels of precariousness
- ~fifth are unionised









# Conclusion

- Ireland relies on unpaid care work
- Facilitated by welfare transfers
- Low investment in services
- Reliance on informal paid care
- Barriers to employment
- Early years work low pay and unattractive
- Adult care also low pay and unattractive





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
